





LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



Thank you for being an important part of the MWS community and for caring about Montana's youth, our public lands and wild spaces, and the future of our region. In December of 2017, MWS celebrated our 4th year as an organization. I am thrilled to see how far we have come and excited about the possibilities that lie ahead. Without your help and support we truly wouldn't be able to accomplish so much and impact the lives of so many amazing young people!

I am proud and humbled to witness the early success and growth of our empowering youth program. In the last two years, the MWS Youth Wilderness Program has grown 306%; from 16 students to 65. And when you consider that we work with students for 24 hours a day our student program hours increased from 6,888 hours in 2015 to 19,368 in 2017. That is over 19,000 hours of these young people being outside without their screens, living, eating, solving problems, and working together. They learn leadership,

communication, and technical skills while increasing their knowledge about relevant conservation issues and the importance of our public lands and wild spaces.

With your support MWS continues to be inclusive to ALL motivated Montana students 14-18 years of age that differ culturally, geographically, racially, and socioeconomically. The MWS Scholarship Fund is instrumental in making this happen. In 2017 we awarded 25 deserving Montana students a total of \$76.340 to attend our Youth Wilderness Program. We are proud to say since MWS' inception, we have NOT had to turn a deserving student away because of financial need. Thank you for continuing to make this possible.

As we move towards our fourth operating season providing transformational experiences for our young future leaders we hope you will continue to be part of our important work. We couldn't do it without you. Thank You!



2017 PROGRAM REPORT



nce again, 2017 was year of significant growth at the Montana Wilderness School. Our enrollment over the last two years has increased by 300%. MWS successfully ran seven open enrollment expeditions and two contracted courses for youth-focused organizations. Sixty-five students had fundamentally transformative experiences in seven unique wild lands of Montana. Students were educated about wilderness self-care, camp craft, Leave No Trace, wilderness medicine, leadership, communication, mountaineering and whitewater paddling. Students were challenged by terrain and weather in addition to developing cohesive expedition teams and lifelong friendships.

The 2017 field season provided both organizational successes as well as instructive challenges which helped us identify the path forward as MWS continues to grow. MWS was also able to successfully run two contracted courses which were overwhelmingly positive. We expect the contract course aspect of MWS programing to continue to grow in 2018. In addition, 2017 demonstrated that with our focus on improved student outreach, recruitment, and retention and with the addition of high-quality staff in those outreach areas MWS significantly increases student numbers. The introduction of expedition wranglers (course supervisors) proved to be extremely beneficial to achieving desired organizational sustainability and further mitigating risk for the school. The resoundingly positive feedback from participants and parents underscored a season of substantial growth and remarkable accomplishments for MWS.





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
